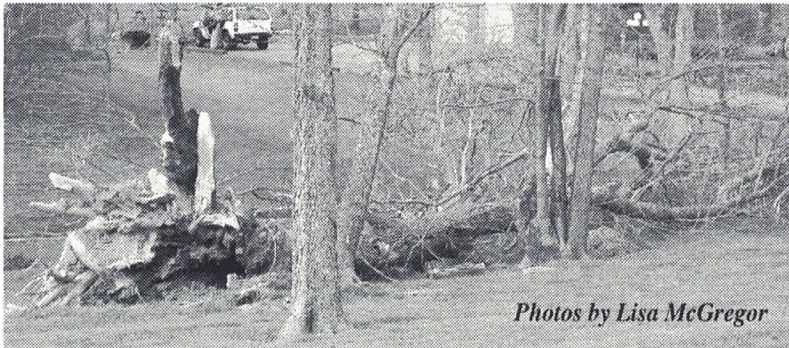

SEVERE SPRING STORMS ATTACK!

On the evening of April 2, 2006, high winds, hail and thunderstorms blew through Pewee Valley, along with the rest of "Tornado Alley," as this part of the mid-west is sometimes called. There was no official report of tornados touching down here, and we were fortunate that no one was hurt, but several Pewee properties lost mature trees (some completely uprooted) and many homes were without power for almost 48 hours. A few century-old trees landed across Ash Avenue & Hwy 146, completely blocking the streets until clean-up was finished late Monday. Thanks to Mayor Stoess for constant contact with LG&E, and thanks to the LG&E work crews for restoring power Tuesday afternoon.

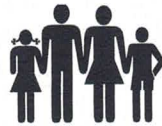

APRIL COUNCIL MEETING

The fourth regular meeting of the Pewee Valley City Council was held on Monday, April 3, 2006. In attendance were Steve Rowland, Dick Filippini, Bob Rogers, Beach Craigmyle, Michael Logsdon and Suzy Walser. Also in attendance were Mayor Clayton Stoess, Jr., and City Attorney John Singler. City Clerk Robin O'Bryan was absent; the City Attorney recorded the minutes for the meeting. Pewee resident Don Helton opened the Council meeting with an invocation, and Mayor Stoess led those in attendance in reciting the Pledge of Allegiance.

FINANCIAL REPORT

Mr. Rowland reported that expenditures were in line with budgeted amounts for the first eight months of the current Fiscal Year. Property tax revenues are back on track.



PUBLIC COMMENTS

Gin Chaudoin stated that she was opposed to the adoption of a historic preservation ordinance in Pewee Valley because of potential restrictions on private property rights.

Ted Merhoff said that he was concerned about the reconfiguration of traffic at Central and Hwy 146 discussed at the last Council meeting. He thinks that the proposed plan would not reduce traffic congestion or improve the safety of the intersection. He believes the current configuration of traffic works well and that the pole in the middle of the intersection does serve a purpose of separating traffic. If any improvements needed to be made, he said, simply re-striping the driving lanes should suffice. He commented that there was no evidence that the intersection poses a danger and that the application for the intersection redesign submitted to the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet by the city should be withdrawn.

Scott Meridith also spoke against the removal of the pole, because it serves the purpose of deterring large trucks from using Central Avenue for turn-arounds.

Don Helton spoke to the issue of sewers within the city of Pewee Valley. He indicated when he was involved with the city government there was no support for sewers in the city, and the current Council would be well advised to keep all decisions about and control over sewer extension under city of Pewee Valley jurisdiction.

POLICE; FIRE REPORTS

There was no Fire Department report.

Police Chief Mike Losik reported that in March he made 51 traffic stops, resulting in 31 warning notices and eight citations. He also responded to 14 calls for service, worked two accident scenes, and made 59 house watch runs. The chief reported that there had been two break-in reports during March, and he urged citizens to “make things difficult” for criminals so they will move on and keep Pewee Valley the safe community that it is. When it is “convenient” for criminals to take advantage of you, such as when you have not locked your car, they are more likely to do so. So do all that you can to deter them—and do lock up! Chief Losik noted that good weather is good

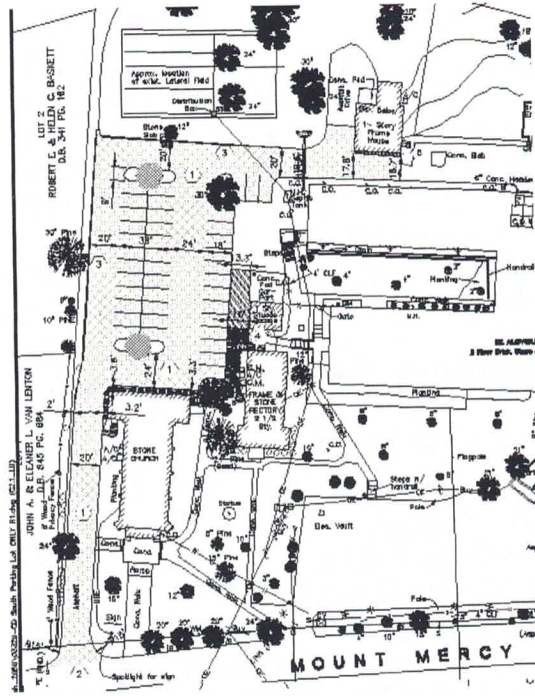


St. Al's Parking Update:

Intersection Re-Design and Pole removal at Central Avenue Railroad Crossing: City Engineer Mel Milburn presented the plans for removing the pole in the intersection and re-directing traffic. He said that the current configuration of the intersection does not meet any roadway standards and is confusing. The solution is to remove the pole and redirect traffic to three, rather than four, lanes: one right turn lane from Central to 146; one left turn lane from Central to 146; and one lane for left and right turns from 146 onto Central. He reported that the city has applied for approval for this plan to the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet (as both roads are state roads) and to LG&E. LG&E has approved the pole removal, and the state application is under review. The state has also been asked to approve a crosswalk with flashing caution

light over LaGrange Road at the Central Avenue intersection, as there is presently no crosswalk across Hwy 146 anywhere in the City. Mr. Roland stated that any crosswalk would be better placed at Muir Lane due to the volume of traffic at Central. Mr. Craigmyle asked about re-striping the intersection without removing the pole. Mr. Milburn replied that there is no way to stripe the intersection to meet engineering standards without removing the pole. Mr. Roland moved to withdraw the City's application for approval of the intersection redesign; the motion failed on a 3-3 tie vote with the Mayor casting the tie-breaking vote against it, meaning the application for approval goes forward. There was further discussion as to whether the intersection project would be built, even if approval is obtained from the state. Mayor

Stoess assured Mr. Roland that the project would not go forward unless approved by the Council.

Grant Application: The grant writer hired by the City has made application for assistance for walking paths and sidewalks to facilitate movement of pedestrians to schools. In the works is a possible grant application for construction of trails and walkways.

Budget For Upcoming Fiscal Year: Mayor Stoess requested that Council members submit estimates for budget needs for the new fiscal year.

Access to City Office and Files By Council Members: The Mayor, the City Clerk, and Council members have met to discuss this issue. Additional file cabinets will be obtained; certain documents will be secured, but all information will be accessible upon reasonable notice and application.

Overlay District For Pewee Valley: Jim Urban, former member of the Oldham County Planning and Zoning Commission, reported on his investigation of the formation of overlay districts. Overlay districts are additional design features that augment zoning regulations. Mr. Urban presented an outline on pro-

posed districts for Pewee Valley, including a neighborhood overlay district, town center overlay district, commercial overlay district, and a transportation corridor overlay district. He is not proposing any historical overlay district. The next step in this process will be to develop an outline on community standards to flesh out the overlay districts. The Council members asked Mr. Urban whether an overlay district plan concept was different from a Master Plan; he replied that they were virtually the same and that both provide additional design and community standards to supplement, but not change, existing zoning.

COUNCIL MEMBER REPORTS

Dick Filippini; Environmental/Properties

A dumpster will be provided for residents' use on the morning of April 22nd. Trees will be given away at the same time as part of Pewee Valley's Arbor Day celebration. CSX has called Mr. Filippini and noted that the repair of crossings is slated for this year beginning at Chamberlain Lane, however there is no indication when they will be fixing the crossings through Pewee Valley. Three bids were received for the mowing contract this season; Mr. Filippini recommended Paul

Allen. The Council voted unanimously to accept Mr. Allen's bid. Mr. Filippini also commented on nuisance conditions existing on property located at 124 Maple Avenue. The County inspector has confirmed that nuisance conditions exist there and appears willing to enforce anti-nuisance laws if Pewee Valley goes forward with a nuisance application.

Beach Craigmyle; Communications/Records

The new code of City ordinances is still being revised. Mr. Craigmyle also proposed providing reflecting street numbers to city residents who do not already have them to aid the fire department and medical in locating houses. After discussion, the Council agreed to investigate extending this service to residents.

Suzy Walser ; Events / Recreation

The caboose repainting will also take place April 22nd. Ms. Walser has secured volunteers and sufficient materials to go forward with the painting.

Michael Logsdon; Public Safety – No report.

Steve Rowland; Finance/Legal – No report.

Bob Rogers; Public Works – Mr. Rogers reported that he received two bids for re-paving Tulip Avenue: Flynn Brothers at \$20,105 and Louisville Paving at \$32,707. The Council voted unanimously to award the contract to Flynn Brothers.

He then reported on the issue of accepting Rosswoods Drive into the City road system. Rosswoods Drive is not up to standard because the final coat of asphalt was never applied by the developer, even though the completion bond has been released by the County. The County engineer will contact the developer to try to have the finish coat applied so that the City can accept the roadway. Mr. Rogers up-dated the Council on the status of the handicap striping at the City Hall: it will be ready for voters in the upcoming May primary elections.

OLD BUSINESS

Sewer Capacity Ordinance – The Council discussed the its proposed amendments to the County ordinance, initiated by the Oldham County Planning and Zoning Commission, that is designed to permit Planning and Zoning to take into account the impact of any proposed development on existing sewer capacity. In last month's Council meeting, Pewee Valley proposed adopting the ordinance with amendments which would make clear that no entity could require the installation of sewers in the City. Mr. Cragimyle said that he understood that the Planning and Zoning Commission would prefer that Pewee Valley not adopt the original ordinance rather than adopt an amended ordinance. The Council voted unanimously in favor of his motion to approve resolution Number Two, series 2006,

to the effect that the City of Pewee Valley would not adopt the proposed subdivision or zoning regulations as they relate to waste water treatment.

Mr. Cragimyle then presented Resolution 3, Series 2006, adopting the judgment of the Oldham County Circuit Court concerning Pewee Valley and the Oldham County Sewer District. The resolution would require 51% of City residents to vote in favor of sewers before a sewer system could be extended into the City. The Council voted unanimously to adopt the resolution.

Sidewalks - The Council discussed the fact that all but one Ash Avenue property owners have consented to construction of the proposed sidewalk. The

low bid for the contract for construction of the sidewalk has already been obtained. Mr. Cragimyle moved to approve the low bid contractor for the Ash Avenue side-

walk, with the caveat that the sidewalk will be installed only on those properties whose owners have given written consent. The Council voted unanimously in favor of the motion. (see graphic on page 9)

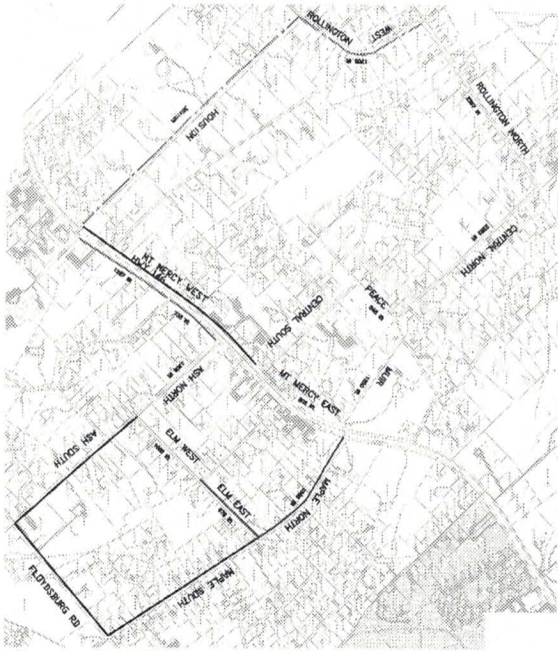

Insurance tax Refund - Mr. Rowland asked the City Attorney whether the insurance refund was appropriate. The City Attorney said that United Health has presented a strong argument that it deserves a refund for two quarters where a computer error had inflated their insurance premium to the City on exempt

policies. Similar refunds have already been obtained from other cities, including Crestwood. The Council voted unanimously to approve the refund.

NEW BUSINESS

Following the payment of bills, there being no further business, the Council meeting was adjourned.

HISTORY FACT OF THE MONTH

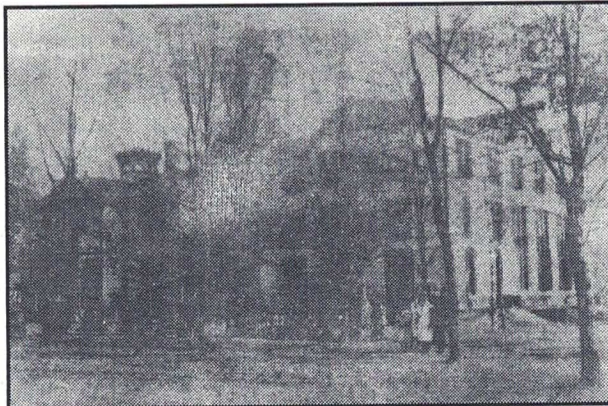
"Tuition, room and board (including washing) at the Kentucky College for Young Ladies in Pewee Valley is set at \$95 per 20-week session.

"The college is located on the Short Line Railroad 16 miles east of Louisville at an elevation of 450 feet above the level of the city. The Town itself is a well-known health resort and is surrounded by country noted for its beauty and the culture of the people."

—1984-85 College Bulletin of the Kentucky College for Young Ladies,

Reprinted in Historic Pewee Valley, published in 1991

In 1873, P.B. Muir, J. M. Armstrong, H.M. Woodruff, Mrs. Annie Craig, A.W. Kaye, Henry S. Smith, W.B. Gray and others formed a group with John T. Moore as trustee, to back E.F. Gallagher in "improving, furnishing and equipping said property for use as a female College." On August 1, 1873, 10 acres



of land, running from Ash Ave. to Tulip Ave., was purchased and a suitable building was constructed as a private, non-denominational school for young ladies. Dr. A.E. Sloan was the first president of the College. Incorporated in 1876, the purpose of the College was "to promote the education of young women in literature, science, and the arts." "The buildings afford a pleasant and comfortable home. Forty rooms, tastefully furnished and each designed for two occupants." Location: "Pewee Valley is known for its Healthfulness, so much so that it has become a noted resort for those in quest of health during the summer months. Many pupils have come feeble and delicate, who, because of the salubrity of the air and its freedom from all causes of disease, have been restored to perfect health. ...Elegant residences, highly cultured society and Christian churches all combine to make it attractive as an educational center." "In order to prevent unnecessary expense in the purchase of clothing, and to remove any temptation to rivalry among pupils in the matter of display, the boarding pupils wear a uniform."

The main building of the school was destroyed by fire in the late 1890's.
