

LOOKS AS IF RATES FOR FIRE INSURANCE WILL BE GOING DOWN

Fire-insurance rates Pewees will be reduced as a result of a reclassification the Pewee Valley Fire District by ISO Commercial Risk Services.

The new rating, which was effective July 1, improved the District from Class 6 to Class 5.

This resulted from an unannounced visit by an ISO representative in April.

With a new engine about to be put into use, the Pewee Valley firemen anticipate a climb to even a higher class -Class 4, only slightly more than a percentage point away.

You can bet that Chief Norman Turner has a bunch of proud firefighters - including himself.

POLICE REPORT

Charges of combining driving and drinking brought the arrests of five motorists on Pewee Valley streets last month. Four were charged with driving under the influence, one with drinking on highway.

Other June charges made by Pewee Valley police were: Speeding, 5; driving on suspended license, front-seat violation (five passengers), improper start, and no brake lights, 1 each.
