

THE Pewee Valley Caboose is resting on tracks laid almost exactly where tracks of another day, paralleling the L&N tracks, carried traffic of another kind. This was the interurban line which ran from Louisville to Pewee Valley beginning in 1901 and eventually was extended through town to LaGrange, operating until 1934.

The picture on the cover depicting the line at the east end of town is one of about 55 illustrations in the Centen-nial booklet, "A Place Called Pewee Valley," still obtainable from Beard's Grocery, Mrs. Robert Wright or Mrs. Jos Mudd at 75¢ a copy.

## CUPID CARRIES ON


